None of the Jews were granted the right to vote in Monor. The town's Jewish voters were greatly astonished. According to the anti-Jewish laws that have recently come into force, all eligible voters must certify their descent and the amount of time their ancestors have lived in Hungary. Naturally, the acquisition of old documents presented Jewish voters with a great difficulty. Their documents were submitted, but their petitions were mostly rejected. Christianised Jews with insufficient documentation were also refused voting rights. Therefore the only Monor Jews who can vote are those who had been in firefight (tűzharcban? Ez azt jelenti, h. a háborúban?) and are thus exempt from anti-Jewish law.
